

## Interview with Paula King

*What is your back ground schooling, work, and hobbies, anything else we could mention that others might not know about you?*

I have an associate and technical degree from Ivy Tech in Design and Cad Drafting. My first job was at Fujitsu-Ten in Rushville where I worked in preventative maintenance. Their major products were electronics for Toyota. After that I went to work for Raytheon where I was able to use my technical degree in designing and laying out work areas in the facility. When I was growing up I got hooked on the TV show Rat Patrol. I really don't know how many of the younger generation even know what the show was about but I was hooked and you will find out how bad later.

*Tell me a little about this jeep and its foreign cousin the Land Cruiser.*

It is a 1948 Willys CJ-2 which originally belonged to the Air Force. Somewhere along the line Rushville bought it for their Civil Defense then when they had no more use for it they sold it into private hands and I later bought it from them. I spent two to three years restoring it by adding new brakes, overhauling the engine, new tires, and cleaned and painted it. However, I still don't have a top for it yet and I am still missing the 50 cal. In the back so I can live out my fantasy of being in the Rat Patrol. If I could just talk our machinist into building that 50 cal. replica to set back there, I would be ready to go. However, I don't think we have any sand dunes around here to jump. As for the Land Cruiser I just like weird vehicles and it fits the bill. There have been more weird things go wrong with it than I care to talk about.

*What caused you to join the AMHF?*

I had joined the Ramp Rats, those who marshal the airplanes at airshows and other fly in events, and we were down at Greenwood. I was asked if I was interested in WWII airplane and of course I had to say yes. They told me there was one back in the hanger I could go look at and I did. I then found out I could become a member and I was hooked from there.

*How long have you been associated with the AMHF?*

I started with Greenwood in 2005 and have been with the AMHF ever since and this makes 10 years.

*How long have you served on the BOD?*

This will be my sixth year serving on the BOD.

*Can you give other members a good reason to step up and fill a director's seat?*

You can look at it as helping to maintain a rare airplane from WWII. It is a great airplane with a history that very few people know about except those associated with her. It is always good to have new people come on to the BOD because they can bring new ideas and perhaps some better ways to help the organization grow.

*Now most of us who work on the Harpoon on a regular basis and have been around you know if someone yells Paula over here that means they have a spot no one else will fit in. What do you have to say about that?*

This is true. It also means I have no doubt seen places in the Harpoon that no one has seen since it left Lockheed Burbank.

*If a person walked up to you and asked about joining the organization what advice would you give him in regards to the work and historical significance of the plane? How about the clothes he would need if he worked on it?*

The Harpoon belonging to AMHF was a small production and is rare. The Harpoon's have a lot of fascinating history to explore and understand. It is rewarding work especially when you have a WWII veteran come on board and start talking to you about his or her experience. You will need to expect the fact there will be highs and lows. This will be even more apparent when you are nursing some skinned knuckles or sore joints from working in one position too long. However, just remember you will come out of the valley and things will look much better.
