





In regards to our WWII veterans I was handed a story this past week from a friend, who had a cousin by the name of Charles Everett who served in the infantry and was in the Battle of the Bulge. Need I mention this was not the place you wanted to be? He was captured along with many others. They were loaded in trucks and taken to an area where there were some other trucks parked, they were ordered out of the trucks and marched into a small depression behind the other trucks at which point the covers came up on the back revealing a machine gun in each truck which commenced firing. Call it luck or something else he was only injured and was covered up by other soldiers falling on him. After the Germans had left he managed to crawl out and somehow make it back to the American lines.

He was eventually sent home to live out the rest of his life which was basically a bottle. Naturally no one had ever heard of PTS at this time so he was more or less just left to take care of himself. If there was something good about this he lived in the attic of his mother's house. My friend was a very young boy at this time and Mr. Everett would talk with him. He always said, "be kind to everyone" and headed off to town to get drunk. One night my friend heard a noise outside his window so he went over and looked out to see what was going on. It was the local police bringing Charles home. They got him out of the car, walked him up to the porch, straightened all of his clothes up, backed up and saluted him. They returned to their car and left. Could this be an example for us? You see PTS was not known about yet, however, the people of this town knew Charles Everett and knew what had happened and were trying to take care of him as best they could.
